The Social Welfare portal can provide a single point of access to our vast print and digital collections of research and information on policy development, implementation and evaluation.

It is a free, easy to use service offering information on all aspects of social welfare in the UK and overseas:

Children and families – child protection, family support and youth engagement

Vulnerable adults – care, safeguarding and inclusion of older adults, disabled people, refugees and asylum seekers

Minority groups – social exclusion, discrimination and integration

Offenders and the criminal justice system – punishment, resettlement and rehabilitation

Benefits – poverty alleviation and redistribution

Health services – NHS reform and its impact on users

Education and the state – from early years to postgraduate level

Community development and regeneration – the Big Society, community empowerment and the Third Sector

Employment – labour market, welfare-to-work and activation policies

Housing and homelessness – social housing, private renting and the housing market

Social services – social work and social care in the statutory and voluntary sectors

Substance misuse – control and treatment

Most of these can be delivered in print or electronic form or accessed immediately through hot links in your results list.

Our monthly current awareness bulletin, *Welfare Reform Digest*, keeps you up to date with the latest policy debates, controversies and developments through abstracts from research monographs and articles in academic journals, professional magazines, and quality national newspapers.
